Summary



- This presentation reports on the European Maritime Certification of Competence (COC) practices.
- The research was conducted with the participation of six partner countries (Bulgaria, Romania, Spain, Turkey, Ireland, Slovenia), covering national practices related to STCW training and seafarer certification.

Research Methodology



Each partner collected information from their country's maritime administration.

COC Requirement under STCW within EU



"Under the STCW Convention masters and officers / engineers and officer shall hold certificates of competency (CoC) entitling the lawful holder to serve in the capacity and perform the functions involved at the level of responsibility specified in the document."

To become a master or an officer on board seagoing ships flying an EU Member State flag, you need to hold a certificate of competency by completing specific approved education and training, fulfil the requirements in terms of minimum age, medical fitness, seagoing service and meet the standards of competence as prescribed in the STCW Convention.

Holders of certificates of competency issued by other EU Member States or non-EU Member States shall also hold an **endorsement** attesting the recognition of the said certificate issued by the EU Member State whose flag the ship flies.

National administrations use STCW standards for recognizing foreign certificates. However, specific rules and criteria exist for recognizing certificates issued by certain countries.

Requirements for CoC recognition across EU Member States:



- The person has submitted an application with attached the certificate of competency and its endorsement, valid health certificate, identity document;
- The Administration, which has issued the certificate and its endorsement, shall certify their authenticity;
- Seafarers are required to speak the working language which is set by the employer. If it is English, then the CoC covers this. If it is a national language the additional certificate of language competence is required.

Requirements for CoC recognition:




- personal request (printed form) written and signed by the applicant through which he assumes full responsibility for the authenticity and legality of the submitted documents;
- valid certificate of competency/proficiency;
- valid GMDSS certificate (in case it's a separate document);
- valid attesting endorsement of the certificate of competency/proficiency (where appropriate);
- identification document;
- request from a shipping company or a company operating ships flying EU Member State flag;
- valid psychologically medical visit for the position held.

Masters and Officers COC



Available to serve on EU flagged vessels In total 309,597 Masters and Officers




- To crew their vessels, shipowners of EU Member States may choose to recruit from among more than 300,000 masters and officers, holding the relevant certificates.
- One-third of these masters and officers hold certificates of competency issued by non-EU states and endorsed by EU Member States.

Non-EU masters and Officers available to EU vessels






Filipinos (36.4%), Ukrainians (21.5%), Russians (13.5%), Indians (10.4%), Turks (5.3%).

Cross Recognition




- There are still challenges in cross-recognition arise due to differing STCW training practices within/outside Europe.
- Some EU member states impose stricter standards, leading to complications in certificate revalidation.
- For Ireland, the United Kingdom is now a third party country since leaving the European Union.

National and International Cases



Third country qualified seafarers from the perspective of the EU are shown to hold certifications that are not fully aligned with standard STCW qualification.
